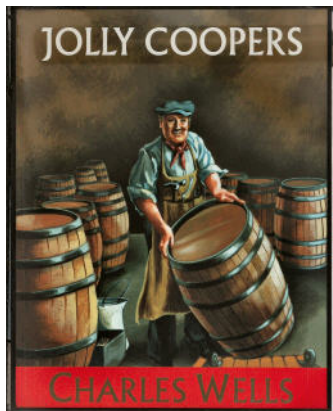


**WHAT'S INN A NAME**

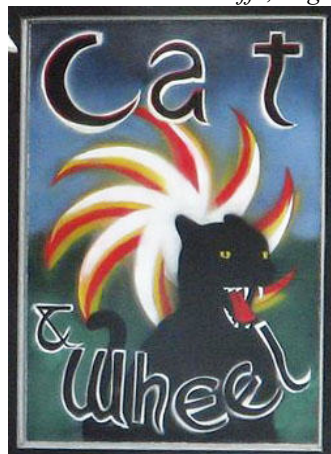
**MOTHER REDCAP** Luton

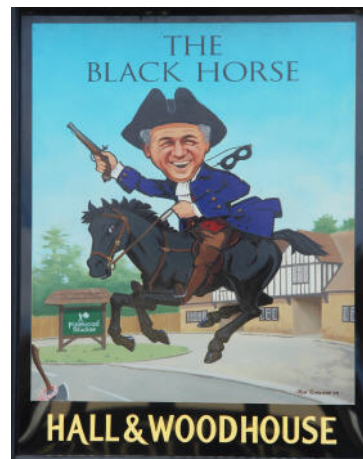
**BLACK HORSE** Slough Rd. Iver Heath

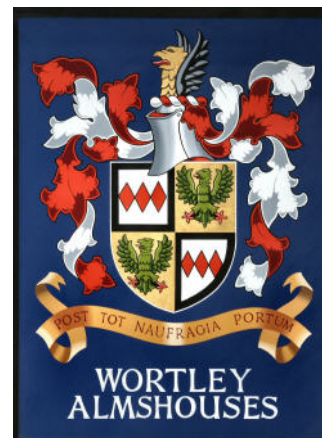

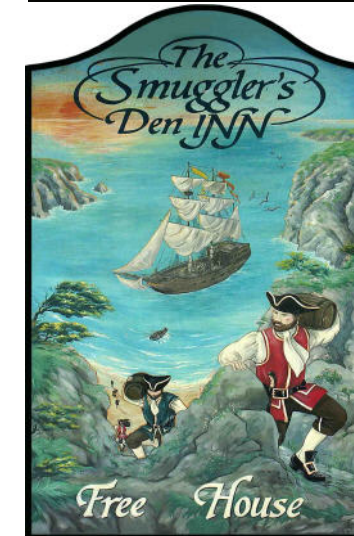
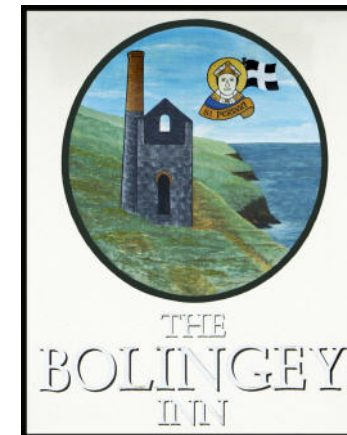
**WORTLEY ALMSHOUSES** Peterborough  
*Westgate* This Sam Smith's pub was converted from almshouses in 1982. The buildings were purchased by local M.P. Sir Edward Wortley Montagu in 1837 to provide support for the city's poor. He was the grandson of the first Earl of Sandwich, whose family motto appears on the sign: "Post Tot Naufragia Portum" ("After so many shipwrecks a haven" - appropriate for an almshouse). *Photo: Lester Cooper, March 2010*
